Empowering Diverse Learners and Transforming Lives and Communities

Presenters: Poppy Clapperton, Renee Tawhiti



Poppy Clapperton. With over 20 years experience in vocational training, Poppy believes that education is about transforming lives, especially for Māori, Pacific and neurodivergent learners.

Through Industry Training Solutions (ITS), Poppy's brainchild, she has cultivated an inclusive, welcoming environment filled with manaakitanga; delivering a programme of courses, resources, and activities tailored to meet diverse student needs, all within a framework of individualised and mixed-model learning. The short, intensive courses are delivered nationwide and cater to schools, iwi, community groups, and regional employment initiatives such as Mayor's Taskforce for Jobs.

Since 2021, Poppy, with her husband and dedicated ITS team, has also run the purpose-built All-Sorts Centre, a multifaceted hub for priority learners that promotes holistic learning and whānau with community engagement.



Renee Tawhiti brings over 20 years of industry experience and a deep passion for education, culture, and community to her role as Lead Facilitator of the Skills for Living for Supported Learners & Foundation Skills programmes at ITS. Originally trained as a chef, Renee honed her leadership, teaching, and team management skills in the hospitality sector before transitioning into vocational education.

Since joining ITS in 2023, she has been instrumental in supporting and leading the ITS Skills for Living and Foundation Skills programmes, where she empowers learners with essential life and employment skills.

A fluent speaker of Tongan and a dedicated advocate for Te Ao Māori me ōna tikanga, Renee weaves cultural values into her teaching, ensuring an inclusive and supportive learning environment for all students. She holds a Level 4 Certificate in Health and Wellbeing (Social and Community Services) and is currently pursuing further professional development in autism education through Ako Aotearoa workshops, adult learning, Te Tiriti o Waitangi implementation, and dyslexia support.

Prior to her role at ITS, Renee worked as a support worker in the emergency housing sector, reinforcing her dedication to helping individuals overcome challenges and unlock their potential. Her mission is simple but profound: to support, guide, and inspire learners to become the best versions of themselves.

Presenters: Tim Seaholme, Janell Kiriona



Tim Seaholme and **Janell Kiriona** (Ngāti Huia, Ngāti Raukawa, Ngāi Tahu, Te Arawa, Muaūpoko) are Te Atakura Coaches at UCOL in Palmerston North, New Zealand. Tim holds an MSc in Exercise Physiology, postgraduate qualifications in teaching, and has over 20 years of experience in tertiary education in both the UK and New Zealand. He has presented at conferences, led workshops, and published research articles. Tim has been an active member of the Te Atakura team since its inception in 2013. Janell possesses a PgCert, a Bachelor of Exercise and Sports Science, and is currently studying towards her Tāhuhu Ahunga Tikanga (Masters in Māori Laws and Philosophy). After initially experiencing Te Atakura as a teacher, she joined the Te Atakura coaching team in 2020. Janell also plays a leading role in Māori cultural capability as Pouahurea – He Kakano Rua. Together, Tim and Janell draw on their diverse culturally located backgrounds, experiences and perspectives as Tangata Whenua and Tangata Tiriti, to lead educational reform in New Zealand's tertiary sector. Both have held leadership positions, are recognised as Teaching Fellows, and have received institutional teaching awards. Their collaborative approach centres on embedding and sustaining Te Atakura within UCOL and beyond, fostering inclusive and effective educational practices that prioritise ākonga Māori and enhance the educational experiences and outcomes of all.



Communities of Practical! Empowering Diverse Minds through Communities of Practice

Presenters: Dr Sharon Crooks, Dr Kathryn McGuigan



Dr Sharon Crooks is a lecturer in social psychology and postgraduate supervisor within the School of Psychology at Massey University, Manawatu, New Zealand. Her research interests are predominately neurodiversity focused, especially at the intersection of cooccurring health conditions and/or within ecological contexts that constrain and impact alternative ways of being and making sense. Sharon has ADHD, was a high school drop-out, and is using this second-chance educational experience to spotlight the systemic struggles of smart people, notably neurodivergent tertiary students constrained by neuro-normative privilege. She is a qualitative researcher favouring phenomenological approaches that give voice to experts and gets to the heart of their experiences.



Dr Kathryn McGuigan is a senior lecturer in Health and Social psychology at Massey University, Auckland campus, New Zealand. Her research interests are broadly in the area of critical health psychology using qualitative methodologies. More specifically Kathryn is interested in exploring the intersections of health and wellbeing within disability, neurodivergence, eating and food practices, and gender. Kathryn is a passionate ally for social justice for disability and neurodiversity with recent research focusing on neurodivergent tertiary students experiences. Kathryn is also passionate about innovative qualitative methods including arts based research.

Strengthening Pacific Thought Leadership in Education

Professor Palatasa (Tasa) Havea's career has been dedicated to advancing the Pacific community and the dairy industry in New Zealand. As Dean Pacific at Massey University since 2020, he has led transformative initiatives that have dramatically improved Pacific students' education outcomes. His leadership in the New Zealand dairy industry has led to groundbreaking technologies, generating substantial economic returns. Recognised for his contributions, he was honoured with the Queen's Medal, MNZM in 2018. He is committed to fostering diversity, building capacity, and driving positive change in education, governance, and community development, demonstrating his career-long commitment to impactful, outcome-driven initiatives.

The programme also involves high-quality professional learning and development courses and workshops, online webinars, educator pathways hosted on Pathways Awarua, plus leading work on learner agency digital literacy and neurodiversity.

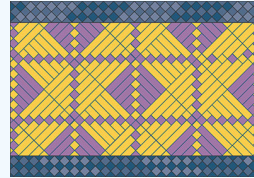

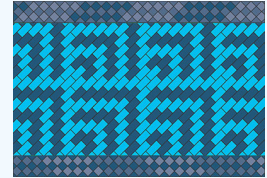


Te Pātaka Mātauranga Māori | Storehouse of Māori Knowledge

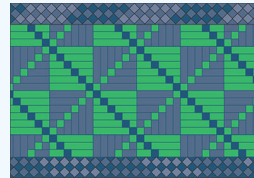

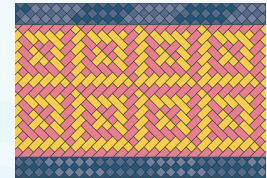
