Tribal Area

Ngāti Whātua-whānui or Ngāti Whātua-tūturu refers to a confederation of four tribes occupying the lands between the Hokianga Harbour and Tāmaki (Auckland). The tribes are Te Roroa, Te Uri-o-Hau, Te Taoū and Ngāti Whātuao-Ōrākei. The shorter title of Ngāti Whātua is sometimes used to describe both the wider confederation and the fourth member group. While it is tempting to think of the four groups as hapū (descent groups) of a single iwi, each is an independent tribe that can act with others or independently.
