# Tikanga Māori Mātāpono Tikanga Māori Principles

Ako means to both teach and learn. Ako represents a reciprocal relationship between student and teacher in the shared learning experiences. Tikanga practice could include:

- Kaiako need to observe and only intervene in the learning spaces of tamariki when invited.
- Supporting tamariki with puzzle manipulation is about guiding tamariki with running commentary, e.g: perhaps turn it around more, it may fit that way.
- Knowing when to let tamariki delve into their own manipulation of the puzzle pieces is providing the best guidance of all letting them regulate their own learning.
- Remember to praise tamariki for their handeye coordination, fine and gross motor skills, solving their own problems that arise from puzzles, learning to deal with frustration, persevering and being patient.

# Ngā tūmahi: Doing, Action Words

3. Hurirapa (tia): turn upside down, over, up,

4. Ka huri mātau/mauī: turn right, left

5. Whakanōhia: place it

## Ngā rerenga kōrero: Action Phrases

- Ātatirohia, he aha te āhua o tēnā piriri?
   Take your time, what is the shape of that piece?
- 2. Nekehia ngā piriri ka ātatirohia anō. Move the pieces around and look again.
- 3. Me whakaarohia me pēhea te mahi. Think how you do this.
- 4. Hurirapatia te piriri. Turn the piece right-side up.
- 5. Ka tika, whakanōhia ināianei. That's right, now place it.



## Ngā rerenga kōrero: Everyday Phrases

- Ka āwhina mai koe ki te whakatakoto i ngā panga ki runga i te tēpu e Hana?
   Are you going to help set the puzzles out on the table Hana?
- 2. Tēnā koe i tāu āwhina mai. Thank you for helping.
- 3. E hia ngā panga i tīkina e koutou tamariki mā? How many puzzles have you got out tamariki mā?
- 4. Haria te panga ki te papa, mahi ai, Rīpeka. You can take the puzzle to the floor to do Rīpeka.
- Hurihia taua piriri, kia tika te whakatakoto mai.
   Try turning that piece around. It may fit then.
- Tēnā, ka takoto pai ināianei, tīkina atu he mea anō.
   There you go it fits. Now get another piece to do.
- 7. He aha tērā āhua? What is that shape?
- 8. Ka kite atu koe i te whetū ki runga i te pouaka poutāpeta?
  Can you see the star shape on the posting box?
- 9. Hurihia ... kia kotahi anō te wā ... Turn it around ... one more time ...
- Koia kei a koe, kei te tika.There you go, that's correct.
