Te reo Māori is the indigenous language of Aotearoa, New Zealand. As a taonga tuku iho (treasure handed down), te reo Māori is mapped onto the land and waterscapes of this country and is presented within this series of resource books for educational settings.

He rangi **paki** tēnei.

It is fine.



He **rangi mokopuna** tēnei.

It is a fine winter's day.

Kei te **whiti** te rā.

The sun is shining.



He rangi **wera** tēnei.

It is hot today.

Heke te ua Raining

Mākū *Wet*

Kei te pēhea te huarere

How is the weather?



Kei te heke te ua.

It is raining.



He rangi **mākū** tēnei.

It is wet today.

How is the weather?



Kei te **pupuhi** te hau.

It is windy.



He rangi **hauhau** tēnei.

It is a cool day.

Whiti te rā *Fine*

Inanahi *Yesterday*

He aha te āhua o te huarere i te Mane?

How was the weather on Monday? (past tense)



I whiti te rā i te Mane.

It was fine on Monday.

I whiti te rā inanahi.

It was sunny yesterday.

Āwha *Stormy*

Inanahi *Yesterday*

He aha te āhua o te huarere i te Paraire

How was the weather on Friday? (past tense)



I āwhā te rā i te Paraire.

It was stormy on Friday.

I āwhā te rangi inanahi.

It was stormy yesterday.

Hukarere *Snow*

Hukapapa Frost

Ka aha te huarere āpōpō?

What will the weather do tomorrow? (future tense)



Ka heke te **hukarere āpōpō**.

The snow will fall tomorrow.

Ka tau mai te **hukapapa āpōpō**.

The frost will arrive tomorrow.

Kapua *Cloudy*

Ua tīhengi *Light showers*

Ka aha te huarere āpōpō?

What will the weather do tomorrow? (future tense)



Ka puta mai he **kapua** āpōpō.

Tomorrow will be cloudy.



Ka tau mai he **ua tīhengi** āpōpō.

There will be light showers tomorrow.
